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Earlier in the summer, one of my oldest friends suddenly died. Michael has known me since I was eighteen. He was an inspiration for me, first in becoming an active Christian, and secondly as I explored a call to ordination. He has been there for me for over twenty-five years.

It goes without saying that I will miss Michael very much.

He taught me two things above all.

The first is about the importance of praying for people, and of allowing oneself to be prayed for.

Michael was hugely disciplined in his prayer. He kept a diary so that he could make sure that he would pray for people regularly. He remembered their birthdays, and included these and other significant events in his praying. Most importantly, he was very down to earth about his prayer life. For him, it was akin to washing his face or brushing his teeth: something that he did regularly and without fuss, because it was important to do. And as he did to others, so he drew prayer from them in return.

I very much doubt that I will ever be as disciplined in my prayer as Michael was: but I try to be.

The other thing that Michael taught me was about generosity. He was generous with his time, he was generous with his hospitality, and he was generous with his money. He didn't have much, but from what he had,

he gave very generously indeed. And the Church, the Body of Christ, received from his generosity. Working always in poor parishes, Michael's generosity inspired other people to be generous. His churches always paid their parish share. Not for him or his congregations an argument that 'others aren't contributing, so why should we?', or a suggestion that 'we need to put our own house in order before we think about anyone else'. To Michael, the diocese was a family of parishes, and in a family everyone supported everyone else. His attitude was remarkably liberating, rooted as it was in the knowledge that God had given generously to him, so it was his joy to give generously to God's people. I very much respect this unselfconscious attitude to money, and pray that I may grow in it myself.

So, uncertain though I am about the discipline and quality of my prayer, I am certain that Michael's example of generosity challenges me every time I worship: do I have the simple, gracious, generous dependence on God that he had, and am I as generous with my time, my hospitality and my money as he was with his? If I am not yet satisfied about any of these things, then here are things that I can do something about.

In September, as the harvest that began at Lammas during high summer comes to its end, I will be thinking about the different gifts that I have been given, and about my opportunities to use those gifts in the service of the gospel: gifts of prayer, gifts of time, gifts of friendship and gifts of money. And I will be thinking about Michael, and continuing to thank God for him.

Perhaps you might join me in these thoughts, substituting for Michael whomever it is who has strongly and positively influenced you in your life and in your journey of faith?

#### Saints for October, by Kex Dean

#### Martin Luther, Reformer, 1546

Martin Luther was born at Elsieben in Saxony in 1483, the son of a copper miner. Luther went to Erfurt University, and then the Augustinian monastery in Erfurt. He took his vows as a monk in 1506 but did not achieve the peace with God he anticipated. He was ordained priest in 1507 and then turned to the study of theology at which he excelled and by 1512 he had received both his doctorate and the chair of theology at Wittenberg University.

At some point between 1512 and 1515 Luther had his so-called 'Tower experience' which marked a fundamental shift in his theology and faith. Through studying the Scriptures – notably Romans 1.17, 'the righteous shall live by faith' – he came to believe



that Christians are saved not through their own efforts but by the gift of God's grace, which they accept by faith. Once he had grasped this truth he was transformed from someone fearful of God's wrath into a fearless critic of a Church that was failing to teach this fundamental truth.

Luther's increasing disillusion with the Catholic Church was brought to a head in 1517 by the controversy about indulgences which resulted in his Ninety – Five Theses, published on 31, October 1517. This was intended to initiate an academic debate but got out of hand, resulting in Luther being excommunicated in 1521. But his views struck chords with others, and a bloc of anti-Catholic states began to emerge in Germany. By 1529 the word 'Protestant' had been coined to describe their beliefs. Luther had only wanted to reform the Roman Church but it would not.

As well as the doctrine of justification by faith he asserted the priesthood of all believers, the concept of national Churches, vernacular Scripture and liturgy, the use of hymns in worship and the freedom for clergy to marry. Luther was successful in challenging the might of the Catholic Church partly because of the intellectual changes of the Renaissance and partly because of the political situation in Germany and partly because the technology to disseminate his ideas [the printing press] had recently been invented. But, most importantly, it was his personal courage and willingness to risk his life for the truth that allowed the Reformation to begin and to develop. Luther was a man who spoke from the heart – often in violent and earthly imagery. Luther saw life as a constant spiritual struggle in which he was only able to be victorious through Christ's grace freely bestowed on him. His hymns often reflected this sense of battle, as in these translated verses of a hymn in Germany from 1529.

"With our own might we nothing can, soon we are lost and fallen. But for us fights the righteous man, whom God himself hath called. Ask ye, who is this, Jesus Christ it is, our sole King and Lord, as God of hosts adored, he hold the field forever.

Though earth all full of devils were, wide roaring to devour us, yet fear we no such grievous fear, they shall not overpower us, this worlds prince may still scowl fierce as he will, he can harm us none, he judge, the deed is done, one little word can fell him."

#### Luther died at Eisleben in 1546.

#### Highlights from September PCC

## We had a very busy but productive PCC meeting in September.

- Rosamund and Nigel had a very productive meeting with the Deputy Clerk and the Chair of the Cemeteries Committee a few weeks ago and we hope this will strengthen our relationship with the Parish Council. The slate cordon round the church is finished and we are now asking whether the parish council might be prepared to fund the insertion of a gravel board in order to form a retaining edge to prevent the slate from catching in the mower.
- The first phase of the upgrading of the cremated remains area is now complete and we hope everyone agrees how much better it looks.
- The railings down Church Walk have now been straightened and the Parish Council have removed the laurel that was impinging on them and Matthew is working his way along with the hammerite.
- We authorised some urgent repairs to the guttering and down pipes to prevent water ingress
- We are due to have another meeting shortly with Peter Slinger our architect in order to look in more detail at the Tower and West Window project.
- Our income is not yet matching our expenditure this year.
- An analysis of the changed way in which we take the collection at the 10.30 service has shown a slight decrease in takings but it is generally agreed that it is a less disruptive way of taking the collection.
- The Finance and Stewardship committee has been reformed and is due to meet in October. They will look at increasing our investment income, and ways of upping our giving and develop 'The Friends of All Saints'

- We revisited the idea of setting up a 'Friends of All Saints Church' in order to increase the involvement and engagement of those in the community who are not regular worshippers but who would like to support the church. Isobel Hutchinson, who has been co-opted onto the PCC, agreed do some initial work on this in the hope we can launch 'The friends' at the St Nicholas Fayre,
- The Mission and Outreach group which formed as a result of helping Kate with the Bishop's evangelism initiative has met and reported back to the PCC asking for support to put on another lunch with prayer in November around the All Souls theme. They also plan to do some research on the possibility of an Open Door project for young people on a Friday evening, to put on a Light party as an alternative to Halloween and to offer Beer and Carols at the Horse and Groom as an alternative to Carols round the tree.
- We agreed the contract with the St Nicholas Community Fayre Committee and began to think about what stalls and catering we would be able to provide.
   We are going to be very pushed for volunteers who are able and willing to help with the catering which is of course our chief source of funds.
- The Mary Bass Trust has given each of the parishes it supports 50p per head of the civil population to support the payment of an administrator. For us this amounts to £4000. The deanery clergy are working on a project to combine this money along with expenses given to the Rural Dean to create a deanery administrator who can support the work of all the parish in Elloe East.

#### Care Home Service by Michaela Dean

When is it going to be, can we have another one, is it soon? No it is not someone asking about their holiday, it is someone in the care homes asking about our annual service when they come to us in church instead of us going to them.



This year's theme was "The Seaside". I scavenged some pebbles, shells and other bits and pieces from the beach and Linda brought in some large exotic seashells, and arranged them around the portable altar which we brought to the front of the chancel.

We followed our usual pattern of Home Communion, including having the bread and wine from the morning service.

We have four hymns, always including All things bright and beautiful, which everyone knows and loves.

After a reading from Genesis about the creation of the sea, the shells and pebbles were taken around to each of the residents to touch, feel and smell. This evoked many happy memories of earlier times, when they were children, when they took their children and for some when they were taken by their home and carers.

Then for the best bit. Cups of tea, sandwiches and cake made by members of the congregation, and any other foods that it is thought the residents would like.



A feast was consumed amid lively and often quite loud conversation, with residents and congregation getting to know each other.

It was a lovely afternoon, enjoyed by all and eagerly anticipated for next year.

Thank you to everyone who contributed in any way to make this, such a delightful time. A memory which is often mentioned when we go to visit the residents each month.

#### St Nicholas Community Fayre - by Jane Francis

When I started this project 5 years ago I couldn't have imagined what it might turn into today. After initial conversations with Rosamund, we brought together a community group and set about organising some kind of event that would fill the void of the old Holbeach Christmas Street Fayre that had closed. It wasn't easy and over time we have faced much criticism for not being able to provide a street fayre. What many failed to realise that in the last five or so years, the issues around Health and Safety, public liability, insurance etc. have become more and more complex and the closure of the main street was no longer a viable option. So we ploughed on, starting with a two day event in the church. I always remember Rosamund's face when she saw the hive of activity on that first day, and a comment from a colleague on the lines of 'Is this really going to work?' As it turned out, it was a brilliant weekend and resulted in a very happy vicar and lots of exhausted volunteers.

Each year we have tried to build on the initial event and we have seen in particular the outside area being utilised to the full with marquees, children's roundabouts, food stalls and much more. Lasting memories include the giant children's story book in the church and a gentleman aged 80+ strutting his stuff as part of a Zumba dancing troup. We weren't always blessed with the weather either. I think the second year we arrived on the Saturday morning to find that the marquee had been destroyed by the wind and we had to re-accommodate everyone indoors but we managed somehow! Fortunately the last two years



have been kinder to us and in 2016 we even had sunshine! More please!

This year's Christmas Fayre is going to be somewhat different, with the event taking place on Friday evening 30th November, Saturday 1st December during the day and also Saturday evening. We hope it will involve a spectacular light show, created by the children of Holbeach, lighting up the church tower and the night sky in and around the centre of Holbeach, all of which is currently subject to grant funding. There will also be the usual stalls both inside and outside the church and a range of food and drink on offer. Choirs, dancers and other entertainers will add to the atmosphere. We also hope to close off part of Church Street during the two evenings, allowing plenty of viewing area for the public. It is anticipated that this event will draw in much larger crowds than in previous years.

Holbeach Regeneration CIC (which also runs the Holbeach Food Fayre), are the group now responsible for running the Christmas Fayre and they have joined forces with Threshold Studios who work with communities to deliver a whole range of arts programmes. The intention in the long run is to put together a 5 year project that will deliver a whole range of Arts Projects in Holbeach. The idea is to engage the whole community and in particular disadvantaged groups. Much of this will be centred around the Christmas Fayre.

None of this would be possible without the small team of volunteers that have worked tirelessly to put on this Fayre over the last 5 years. It currently costs us more than £2000 per annum to put the event on, much of which is raised by our wonderful volunteers. So I would particularly like to thank all those who have played their part. We couldn't have done it without you.

#### **Volunteers Needed**

**Holbeach Community Larder and Cafe** is on the look-out for a few more volunteers to take the place of those who have moved onto paid work or have had to give up due to ill health.

The Community Larder and Cafe are open to the public at Holbeach Reading Rooms between 10.00 - 1.00 for the collection of food parcels and for lunch between 12.00 - 1.00.

There are a range of roles available.

- Cooks must have experience of cooking for large numbers
- Kitchen assistants
- Serving at table
- Washing up and clearing away
- Store rooms assistants packing parcels and stocking shelves
- Supermarket pick-ups (if you can't offer time on a Friday we need people with transport to collect left over items from the supermarkets on a Thursday evening)
- One off stock sorting and storing after a major appeal (usually at harvest time or Christmas)

Full training will be given and you will be part of a co-operative and friendly team and take your place on a rota as often as you are willing – every week, once a fortnight or once a month for example.

#### Closure of Lloyds Bank in January 2019



Most of you will have heard that Lloyds, our last remaining bank in Holbeach, will close in January 2019. This is going to affect us in many ways. As far as the Church is concerned, it will mean that the fortnightly banking will be more difficult. At the moment I take a heavy sealed bag into the bank and leave it there for them to count in their own time (deferred checking). When the bank closes I can take cash into the Post Office but they do not accept bags for Deferred Checking, Neither do they have cash counting machines. It takes the church counters, on average, half an hour to count all the coins and notes. Can you imagine being in the Post Office queue if you want a stamp and you are behind me? Another possibility is to take

it into a bank in Spalding. This is an extra journey and I will have to carry a heavy bag from the car park to deposit in either the night safe or over the counter. As I don't normally go to Spalding Centre during business hours it would be a special journey. Of course there are potential plans for a mobile bank coming to Holbeach but no details are available yet.

Solutions? Well there are a couple of options. Perhaps there is someone in the congregation who would be prepared to take the money into Spalding Lloyds Bank on a weekly basis? Or better still those of you who give cash either in envelopes or in the open plate could change to direct payments via the bank by either a Direct Debit or Standing Order. Please think about how you may be able to help and please speak to Carole or Glyn (our planned giving secretary) if you want to change the way you give your weekly donation. We hope that one way or another banking will become easier with time.

We plan to take the youngsters up to Lincoln in the morning to complete a treasure trail and have lunch together before an afternoon of singing.




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
