#### Saints for February and March by Kex Dean

#### Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, Martyr, c 155. 23 February.

When Polycarp was 86 years old, he was bound, slain by the sword, and his body burnt in the arena at Smyrna, in front of a crowd baying for his blood. He was one of the first Christian martyrs and, according to his own account, had been a believer since childhood. His words at his trial, when he was asked to swear against God, have echoed down through the centuries as a testimony of one man's obedience to Christ. He said, "For eightysix years I have been his servant and he has never done me wrong, how can I blaspheme my King, who saved me."

Originally one of the disciples of John, Polycarp is a link between the apostles and the earliest Church Fathers. Accounts of his martyrdom were circulated from very soon after his death and give witness to the Early Church tradition of venerating martyrs and saints.

As one of the first bishops of Roman Asia, he tried to set a date for celebrating Easter with Anicetus, Bishop of Rome, but they failed to agree a compromise between their two traditions. The Church at Rome always celebrated Easter on a Sunday, but in Asia it was celebrated according to the Hebrew calendar, on whichever day of the week it fell. This had been a burning issue within the Early Church, and remained so for a long time. However, a mark of the esteem in which Polycarp was held can be seen in that he presided at the celebration of the Eucharist at Rome at the end of the discussions.



Polycarp is also remembered for the way in which he defended Christianity against early attacks, particularly by the Gnostics who sought to dilute the Church's understanding of the nature and person of Christ. Much of his writings are concerned with correcting heretical ideas of the Incarnation, particularly those of Marcion. On one occasion when Polycarp was asked if he could recognize Marcion in a room, he replied, "of course I recognize the first born of Satan."

Polycarp is remembered as an example of humility under persecution, and as a man who showed true Christlike character throughout his life. In his letters he exhorts the Church to pray for those that persecute them and are in authority over them praying:

"Pray also for kings and powers and rulers, and for them that persecute you and hate you, and for the enemies of the cross, that your fruit may be manifest unto all, that you may be perfect in him."



#### Chad, Bishop of Lichfield, Missionary, 672.

Chad, was a pupil of Aidan, who had established Christianity within Northumbria, during the reign of King Oswald [634-42].

Chad spent some time at the monastery of Lindisfarne, where, along with his

brother Cedd he was taught by Aiden. He also spent some time in Ireland as part of his education.

In 664 he succeeded his brother as Abbot of Lastingham in the North York Moors. Later that same year King Oswy of Northumbria decided to consecrate Chad as his bishop. This was a somewhat irregular move, as the only reason for his consecration was Oswy's impatience. The designated Bishop of Northumbria, Wilfrid had travelled to France to be consecrated but was an exceptionally long time returning. Eventually Oswy tired of the delay and consecrated Chad bishop in a ceremony under the authority of the Celtic bishops, rather than those of the newer Roman tradition.

On his eventual return to Northumbria, Wilfrid discovered that his original nominator [Oswy's deputy] had died, and that another bishop had been consecrated in his place. Theodore visited the region in 669 and remarked upon the irregularity of the situation. Chad voluntarily gave up his position and returned to Lastingham. Impressed by the humility of Chad, Theodore made him Bishop of Mercia. He repeated the entire consecration ceremony, as he considered the first ceremony invalid because of the overwhelming presence of Celtic bishops.

Chad fixed his residence at Lichfield, and led the diocese for two years. He travelled widely and established a monastery at Barrow, Lincolnshire. He oversaw the formation of Lichfield as an ecclesiastical centre before his death from the plague in 672.

#### Bishop of Lincoln speaks in the House of Lords



#### My Lords, I am honoured to speak after the Noble Baroness, Boothroyd.

I wish to say something about my context and then consider what a bishop might usefully add to this debate. Lincolnshire is one of the parts of the United Kingdom which voted most emphatically in favour of the UK's withdrawal from the EU with 66% voting to leave.

I have thought hard about why that should be the case.

There are the obvious reasons – the tip of the iceberg.

Nationally these would be described in terms of sovereignty and immigration.

We who live and work in rural Lincolnshire are prisoners of our geography (the countryside comprises a series of sparsely-populated settlements disconnected from each other where you learn to fend for yourself) but we are also heavily influenced by our history in which, over the centuries, external forces have sought to take control of our land and laws – sometimes against our best interests. People have come to:

- · demand money with menaces,
- to conquer,
- to trade,
- to work
- and, in more recent years, to seek refuge and a better life for their families.

Sometimes we have fought back – occasionally we have grumbled, but most of the time, as a generous people, we have gone with the flow of all this and adapted.

But then there is what lies below the surface: an international rise in populism playing on fear, with its accompanying narrative of the purity of what it means (in our case), to be British. There is also a naïve view of democracy as plebiscite – 'the people have spoken'. You don't need to be a polling expert to understand that people vote in elections and referenda for a variety of reasons: some noble, some flawed.

We in Westminster are under intense scrutiny. The questions in the lanes of Lincolnshire (and I was in in a fen village near Holbeach last Sunday) appear to be why is it taking 'them in London' so long to sort this out and from some, why can't we explore some kind of compromise to get it done?

So what can a bishop from Lincolnshire add?

I have heard almost all the speeches in this debate and I am grateful for their differing perspectives. I have heard quite a lot of rhetorical certainty when we really know that the situation is extraordinarily complicated.

Over the years the church has learned and is learning, sometimes quite painfully, to manage diversity and it does so by recognising the compromised nation of our institution. I hope the most reverend primates will forgive me if I say that, this side of heaven, the church is not perfect.

One former member of your Lordship's House knew Lincolnshire well. Michael Ramsey, 100th archbishop of Canterbury began his ministry there.

Ramsey was a brave and challenging thinker and spoke out clearly against injustice, including homophobia and apartheid; but in those early years in Lincolnshire he counselled the Church of England to understand itself much more carefully as a compromised body. He wrote: (The Church of England's) credentials are its incompleteness, with tension and travail in its soul. It is clumsy and untidy; it baffles neatness and logic... for it is sent not to commend itself as "the best type of Christianity" but by its very brokenness to point to the universal Church wherein all have died.

The Church of England has always had to manage diversity and still needs to do so.

Whatever happens over the next few weeks and months – and no one really knows what it is going to happen -- I suggest, as a nation, we need to recognise that we are profoundly divided and need to manage diversity better – with respect and humility.

My Lords, the Regret Motion as worded does present problems for those Members of your Lordships House who might agree with the sentiments about a no deal Brexit, but are less inclined to dismiss the Government's Withdrawal Agreement in the absence of any worked-through alternative, or indeed any alternative model of Brexit that might not also have the effects the Motion describes. For that reason, your Lordships should not be too surprised if they see members of this bench exercising their democratic rights in either lobby, or choosing to abstain, if and when the Motion is put to a Division.

The people of the United Kingdom are a mixed bunch – we are in this together and we need to remember and practise the art of compromise in order to be the best nation we can be.

#### A Deanery Administrator for Elloe East

It is with huge excitement that I am able to announce that Caz Dennis has been appointed as our very first Deanery Administrator. She was one of 4 people interviewed by Gareth, Jill Duffey and I, we were unanimous in our support of her and she is really excited to be taking up the post.

Caz lives in Holbeach and has a daughter at William Stukeley school and a son due to start there in September. When she lived in Portsmouth as a young woman she began her career as an administrator for the police before training as a Crime Scene Investigator. Most recently she has worked as a supervisor at Tesco including a spell as the Community Champion here in Holbeach – so she is well known in Holbeach. She attended church as a child and was married at All Saints and had her son christened here and they occasionally attend church as a family.

Her particular skills are good customer service, IT competence and a passion for dotting i's and crossing t's and a desire to be involved in the local community – so a good combination.

We have agreed that she will work 16 hours a week from 9.00-1.00 Monday to Thursday until her son starts school in September and then we will review whether this is the most effective use of her time or whether we will move towards 9.00-12.00 for 5 days a week. she will be based in an office that has been made available to us by Holbeach Parish Council in the Coubro Chambers, which will both ensure a safe working environment for her but also an easily accessible venue for the general public.

We do not yet have a start date but are hoping we might be able to get things up and running from 4th February – though the first week will be an induction period introducing her to people and getting IT systems up and running so we will let you know when the office is open to the public and ready for action. Our plan is to introduce tasks gradually so that we can get the most effective systems in place right from the beginning.

Her immediate line manager will be me, but her post and the way in which it is developed will be managed by Gareth Atha, Jill Duffey and myself with Paul Arnold and Carole Williams keeping an eye on the finances and payroll management.

We are hugely indebted to the Mary Bass Charity which has wholly funded this post for the Mary Bass Churches and to the diocese which has agreed to fund 6 hours a week as part of its commitment to support the Rural Dean's role and to all the non-Mary Bass churches who have committed a nominal sum each to enable the role to cover 15 parishes in the deanery. The Long Sutton Group of three parishes has opted to make their own arrangements.

Please hold Caz in your prayers as she makes this step in her career and as we set up a fully functioning office space for the deanery.

## citizens advice

## South Lincolnshire

Citizens Advice and Holbeach United Charities team up to offer residents a home visit support service in Holbeach.

Starting on January 22nd, Citizens Advice are able to offer a brand new home visit service in Holbeach and surrounding areas, generously supported by the Holbeach United Charities. Residents will receive advice and support in their own home, to complete applications for Personal Independence Payments (formerly Disability Living Allowance) and Attendance Allowance. In addition, expert advice and assistance will be provided to prepare for benefit tribunal appeals, where benefit is incorrectly denied.

Home visits will be made every Tuesday, following referral from the main office at Spalding, and the Holbeach outreach, which is open every Friday at the Holbeach Youth Centre.

Citizens Advice in South Lincolnshire, incorporating Holbeach, will have been providing advice, information and support to local residents for 30 years in August. The small team of paid staff, ably supported by a well trained team of committed volunteers, have developed a very good understanding of the needs of the local community, especially those considered vulnerable due to a level of disability and/or low income. By far the largest enquiry area dealt with relates to welfare benefits, accounting for over a third of enquiries each year, in part due to the welfare reforms introduced since 2012.

Lisa Barwell, Chief Officer of Citizens Advice South Lincolnsire, said, "2018 has been a year of complex challenges for our communities. It has been a year of great need for many of our clients, with unprecedented demand for advice and assistance to access basic human needs, such as food. As we look forward to 2019 and the effects of yet more changes to benefits, Universal Credit and Brexit, we are so grateful to Holbeach United Charities for their very generous support, which will help to transform the lives of some very vulnerable clients. By working as a team and supporting each other we will continue to increase our reach and ensure that everyone has access to the advice they need.

Rev'd Rosamund Seal, Vicar of Holbeach & Rural Dean of Elloe East, said. "The experience of running Holbeach Community Larder for the last 5 years has brought to my attention how difficult it can be for some clients to access the help and support they need to help negotiate the minefield, that applying for benefits, has become. I therefore suggested to fellow trustees of the Holbeach United Charity that one of the significant ways we could help alleviate some of the poverty in the area would be to enable more people to have access to advice and support that would help them with this. The trustees were unanimous in agreeing that to provide 3 years' worth of funding for a part time worker for a wellestablished, experienced and respected service such as Citizens Advice would be a more effective way of addressing the poverty of some of the most vulnerable people in our community.'

'Many communities have these ancient 'Aid in Need' charities that were set up by past generous benefactors to help alleviate poverty in their communities

by providing winter fuel allowances or small grants for specific items, and due to wise investment some such charities have accumulated significant sums of money over the years and struggle to find suitable recipients. I am hugely encouraged that Holbeach United Charity has decided to take a different and more farsighted approach by putting significant investment into two long-term projects to provide help in our community. One is the funding of this part time peripatetic advisor for Citizens Advice and the other has been to fund the Thursday outreach session at Holbeach Hub for SoLDAS - (South Lincolnshire Domestic Abuse Service).'

## Children are Welcome

All Saints aims to be a family-friendly church.

We may not always get it right; but we try, because we believe we serve a God who welcomes and includes people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities.

#### What's on at All Saints for Children and Young People On Sundays

We do not currently have leaders available to be able to offer Junior Church or Sunday School on a Sunday morning. However children are welcome to sit with their parents in church and those with pre-school children may wish to sit in or near the Children's Corner towards the front of the church on the south side where children can play safely and complete a gospel related worksheet each Sunday if they wish. We also have KSI and KS2 pew bags available for use in the pews

If babies need changing, feeding, or calming down then you are welcome to use the toilet (with baby changing facilities), the kitchen and the Mary Bass Room under the tower if you need to.

**On the 1st Sunday of each month**, we have a service of All-Age Worship at 10.30 am. These services are regularly led by one of the Uniformed Organisations or members of our Junior Choir and are planned with families and children in mind and are about 40-50 minutes long. They may occasionally include communion.

#### Other things on for Children & Young People

Family Workshops and Youth Events - Every so often throughout the year, usually during a school holiday we hold a Family Workshop - an event for children & adults to attend together exploring a Christian theme and including a short act of worship. We also organise activities for older children from time to time throughout the year. Flyers advertising these workshops and events are circulated via the schools.

#### All Saints Junior Choir

Since April 2016 we have run a Junior Choir for children aged from 8 - 11+. They rehearse on a Friday evening from 6.30-7.30pm and learn basic music theory, plus singing and playing the recorder. When they have reached a specific standard they receive their robes and start taking part in our morning services once a month and in other special services throughout the year. Trips, activities, a BBQ and a concert and awards evening are part of the life of the choir. The choir is affiliated to the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) and children are encouraged to take part in the Voice for Life scheme and earn coloured ribbons as they develop their musical skills and commitment.

Contact our Musical Director Barry Lancaster – 01406 370665 We have adopted the Church of England House of Bishops' policy on Child Protection for all our work with children. All our volunteers have completed a DBS check and safeguarding training, and work under close supervision.

#### All Saints' Baptism Policy

We offer a service of baptism (a Christening) to any child living in the parish. A baptism can take place either within our main morning worship at 10.30am or at a short separate service at 12.15 on the 4th Sunday of the month. A baptism requires the careful choosing of godparents and expects a level of commitment from the parents to bring up their child in the Christian faith. If parents prefer they can ask for a service of Thanksgiving which includes naming the child. This short ceremony can be used on its own, or prior to baptism at a later date.

At the same time (following an assessment) Charlotte S and Lily P were awarded their light blue ribbons and on Sunday 20th January Phillip, Tom, Paige, Graciemae, Matthew, James and Jacob were all awarded their dark blue ribbons.

So well done to everyone. Our Junior choir is now 17 strong and a great asset to our church.

Following the success of last year's Advent Stable Sleep out we repeated the event with eleven of our young people this year. Once again we rehearsed for the Crib Service, went out carol singing, expertly accompanied by Kim on her trusty accordion – this time along Farrow Avenue and Drake's Close. The

highlight was to be invited into Ann Dacey's house to sing Silent Night for her. On our return we enjoyed soup and hot dogs followed by a film and then hot chocolate before bedding down in the





straw in the North porch. Carol Hellen and Sara Williams managed to sit up all night with the children while I got a bit of shut-eye on the floor in the Mary Bass Room keeping an eye out for anyone

who needed a toilet trip or needed to escape from the porch and Terri Judd joined us to help out in the early hours. Once again - though cold, it was a relatively mild night for the time of year though there were guite a lot of rather loud people wandering past the church well into the small hours. In the morning we finished with more hot chocolate and bacon rolls before all going home to bed, with straw in our hair and a few odd socks. It gave the children a little bit of an idea about what it might be like to sleep on the streets and raised a wonderful amount of sponsorship money for the homeless charity Crisis though we haven't added it all up yet.

Our other adventure this last term has been to start a Choir Club after our practice where the choir can do their homework, play board games or traditional group games and let their hair down a bit and just socialise.

As part of their dark blue ribbon assessment the choristers were asked what they enjoy about singing in the choir and I want to share with you a couple of the comments that came from the older ones who have now been with us for 3 years.

"I can talk about anything when I come to choir."

"I have learnt to play the recorder and had lots of experiences and done things that I would never have had the opportunity to do."

Several of our young choristers have had difficulties at school or at home and we are so privileged to be able to offer them a good all round musical education, develop their musical confidence, and be able to provide them with a wonderful opportunity to build on their friendships and be part of a team, and along the way to learn something of God and what it means to belong to a Christian community.
