


Saint Guthlac 11th of April. (673-714) hermit of Crowland (Lincs).

Guthlac was born of royal blood in the Mercian tribe of Guthlacingas. At the age of fifteen he became a soldier (they called him robustus depraedator) but after nine successful years he gave up warfare to be a monk at Repton, where some Mercian Kings were buried, ruled by Abbess Elfrith. He was rather unpopular at first because of his total abstinence from intoxicating drink; later he was better appreciated.

In about 701 he moved on to the solitary life at Crowland on a site accessible only by boat. Here his life resembled the regime of the Desert Fathers; annoyances included attacks by Britons who had taken refuge in the Fens, and violent temptations by devils; consolations were visions of angels and of his patron Bartholomew the Apostle.

After he spent fifteen years as a hermit, he knew that his death was

near. Edburga, abbess of Repton, sent him a shroud and a leaden coffin. His sister Pega, an anchoress at Peakirk, came to his burial with his disciples Cissa, Bettelin, Egbert and Tatwin, who occupied cells nearby. A year later the grave was opened, and the body found incorrupt. People began to come to his shrine at Crowland, to which Pega had given his psalter and scourge. It soon became popular, with Wiglaf, king of Mercia (827-40), and Ceolnoth, archbishop of Canterbury (who was cured of ague by the saint in 851), among its devotees. In 12th century his remains were put in the abbey church built on the site of his cell and the shrine was embellished with gold, silver, and jewels. A magnificent pictorial record of his life survives in the late 12th century Herleian Roll at the British Museum. usually called the Guthlac Roll. This is a series of eighteen roundels, which are cartoons for stained-glass windows. The scenes in it are based on Felix's Life of Guthlac.



James The Less

James The Less 1st century, Apostle 3rd of May.

The son of Alphaeus is often but not with certainty identified with the lames whose mother stood by Christ on the on Cross, and also with lames, the `brother of the Lord`, who saw the risen Christ and is often called the first bishop of Jerusalem. He is also sometimes identified with the author of the Epistle of St James. If not correct, we know practically nothing about James the Less. His traditional iconographic emblem is a fuller's club because he was believed to have been beaten to death with it, after being sentenced by the Sanhedrin in AD62 to be stoned. In England only twenty-six churches are dedicated to lames the Less.




DLL SAINTS **TOWER APPEAL**

Annual Parochial Church Meeting – Tuesday April 9th at 7.30pm

Annual Parochial Church Meeting – Tuesday April 9th at 7.30pm

Our APCM is on April 9th and at that meeting we will need to elect all our church officers for the coming year.

As you know Nigel Beverley Stone has already stood down as warden and Margaret Whaley will be standing down this year, as will our treasurer Carole Williams.

This means we need to find two new wardens and a treasurer. This is a big ask even from a church as big as ours. I want to take this opportunity to thank Nigel for all the work that he got underway on the fabric of the church during his 18 months in office and Margaret for the gentle and faithful way she has served the congregation for the 7 years that she has been in post. I also want to thank Carole who took over the role of treasurer when our previous treasurer Ken Hull died while still in post. She had the extremely difficult job of sorting out all his accounting and picking up all the threads and then last year putting all our financial data on the Data Developments package that we now use for accounting purposes. This was a labour of love, played out against the back drop of closing banks and the need to take our cash into Long Sutton and latterly Spalding to be counted. It has not been an easy time for her.

Without wardens and a treasurer we are going to be in a very difficult position and we need to find a way forward.The role of warden is a responsibility and not a list of jobs – many of the 'jobs' can be done by others but we do need sensible, level headed people who are committed to the good of the whole church. We will also need people to take on some of the 'jobs' in order to share the work load.

The role of treasurer can be divided into two – the person who keeps the books and reports to the PCC and a person who supervises the counting and banking of all the money that comes into church week by week.

We also need at least 4 new members on the PCC to replace those who have either stood down or completed their 3 year stint.

When you read our Annual Report for 2018 you will see that we are a busy church with the scope to do much more in the community. However, to fulfil our calling we need willing volunteers, prepared to live out their calling and discipleship and to be 'The Church' serving God in the world.

Revisiting our Growth Plan – Tuesday April 2nd at 7.30pm

Back in 2015 a number of us took part in the Developing Discipleship Programme, reflecting on the kind of church we were and the kind of church we would like to become. As a result of this we wrote our Mission Statement and Vision and put together a growth plan for the church. On Tuesday April 2nd at 7.30 in the Mary Bass Room, a week before our APCM, we are going to use the time normally allocated to the Ministry Team meeting to look at the Growth Plan we put together in 2015 and see how much of it we have fulfilled, what still needs to be done and where we need to go next. This meeting is open to everyone who is interested but all members of the PCC, the Fabric Committee, the Finance and Stewardship Committee, Mission and Outreach group and the Ministry Team are encouraged to attend.

Parish Giving Scheme

The Parish Giving Scheme was developed in the diocese of Gloucester in 2009 and proved so successful it has been rolled out to other dioceses since then. The Diocese of Lincoln has paid for all parishes in the diocese to be part of this scheme should they wish to opt into it, as our PCC decided to do at its November meeting last year.

A leaflet entitled 'Generous Living' which explains how the scheme works will be circulated to everyone on the electoral roll and those who already give via their bank will be the first to be invited to sign up.

We are however very keen to invite as many of you as possible to sign up to the scheme as the PCC is keen to reduce the amount of cash we receive and phase out the old envelope scheme which is expensive to operate. The envelopes themselves are expensive and opening them and counting out the cash within them is increasingly time consuming. Added to this is the fact that we no longer have a bank in the town and Carole, our treasurer, has had to start driving the 8 miles into Spalding once a fortnight, which costs her in both time, petrol and a parking fee taking with her up to $\pounds 2000$ in cash which is actually a highly risky thing to be asking anyone to do.

There will still be some cash coming into the church coffers which will have to be counted but we hope to reduce the amount of cash coming in from our regular givers in order to cut down on the tedious and time consuming task of both counting and banking the money.

We are also seriously looking into getting a card reader for the church that can be set at a fixed rate to be used by casual visitors as a way of donating to the church or set for specific amounts for people to pay for such things as banns certificates or wedding fees.

For all these reasons it is becoming more and more vital that we keep pace with the way most businesses and individuals now run their finances, and we need to think seriously about the demands we are putting on our own volunteers.

We will still need volunteers to help count the money on a weekly or fortnightly basis however – offers to Rosamund please.

All Saints Ladies Group

All Saints Ladies Group met on 13th February & 13th March. Sharon Cole welcomed everyone at both meetings, apologies noted, and Minutes from the previous meetings agreed as correct.

At the February meeting, Pat Duncan was wished a Happy Birthday. The Holbeach Church & Community Flower Festival in May was discussed, and volunteers were invited to organise a tabletop display in Church, Pat Duncan and Jean Dewhirst have offered to help.

Speaker Martin Dickinson was introduced he gave a talk about the production of Silverskin and pickled onion. He said Silverskin onions are mainly produced in Holland and the larger pickled onions are grown in Poland. Both types of onions are imported to factories in England in large containers ready prepared for putting into jars. In Holland, the onions are mechanically prepared, but in Poland, all the onions are hand prepared by groups of ladies or in local household kitchens as a cottage industry. After answering questions, Martin was thanked by Sharon for his interesting talk. Refreshments were served and the raffle drawn.

At the next meeting, we look forward to welcoming Anthony Grunwell to talk about 'Fusion Cookery'.

At the March meeting, after the usual formalities, matters arising were discussed. Jean Dewhirst is unable to help with the tabletop flower display at Flower Festival, so Joyce Layfield has kindly offered to work with Pat Duncan. Plans for the June outing to the Norfolk Lavender Gardens with afternoon tea were discussed. The Holbeach Community Bus will be used to take us on Thursday 13th June, to leave at 1/1.30pm. The inclusive cost with tea and travel is £20. Sharon asked for a show of hands of those who were interested, which received a positive response. Final details would be available at the May meeting. Sharon will compose an Annual Report of our activities during the past year for the Holbeach Church Annual Parish Council Meeting in April.

Unfortunately, due to illness, Anthony Grunwell was not able to be with us for his talk. Sharon generously arranged two quizzes instead. No winners or losers but chocolates all round instead! Pat Linn and Joyce Fines served refreshments, and the raffle was drawn.

Holbeach and the Clewer Initiative, or what I learned at a potato factory. *By Rosamund Seal*


One Thursday, a couple of months ago, I was given a £2 coin commemorating 200 years since the abolition of slavery. With it was a certificate which said:

This is a commemorative $\pounds 2$ coin circulated in 2007 to represent the end of slavery in 1807.You may spend it, but only when you can prove that there is no slavery in either your supply chain or in your home town.

The coin and certificate was given to me by Shayne Tyler – the Operations Executive at Manor Fresh, one of the Worth Farms in Holbeach Hurn, which specialises in the sorting, cleaning and packing of potatoes chiefly for Marks and Spencer, but also for Aldi.

The event I had given up my day off for, was organised by the Clewer Initiative, and one of the joys for me was meeting Bishop Alistair who chairs the Initiative but who of course we remember as the Bishop of Grantham, before he went off to be the Bishop of Derby. It was also a joy to be welcomed so magnimously into the factory by the father of one of the children I baptised last year!

It was an absolutely fascinating day and I learnt a great deal about the processing of potatoes and the hygiene and health and safety rules that surround the processing, as well as about modern slavery and I left very, very impressed to know that here in our patch is a Food Processing Firm which strives to put its ethical standards alongside its need for a healthy profit margin and prides itself on the fact that a very high percentage of its migrant workforce have been employed by them on permanent contracts for an average of 8 or 9 years. I also learnt how hard it was to ensure that every aspect of a supply chain minimised the



I came away thinking that if we did not grow our own potatoes or buy them direct from a farm then I ought to be prepared to pay the premium and buy them from Marks and Spencers in order to ensure that they were not tainted by slavery.

These are some of the facts:

- 40.3 million people are estimated to be trapped in some form of modern slavery in the world today.
- 136,000 victims estimated in the UK
- 5,145 potential victims found in the UK in 2017

Some of these victims live in our parishes. In 2017 there were arrests under the modern slavery act in Gedney. Many of the migrant families that we occasionally deal with at the Community Larder are seriously at risk and there have been times when I have liaised with the Police and Social Services when I have had specific concerns about people.

I left feeling committed to doing my bit to ensure that the supply chains for so many of the products that we rely on should be free from slavery but also seriously impressed by Shayne Tyler who, through the course of his working life and his experience of the effects of modern slavery, has become a passionate advocate and gifted communicator for equality in the work force.

South Holland should be proud of him.



The cracks are where the light gets in

The other day I was very cross with myself for getting a parking ticket. I know why it happened -1 hadn't looked at the sign and I just assumed there wouldn't be parking restrictions on a Sunday morning. But it really happened because I was preoccupied and rushing. I had too many things to do and not enough time to do everything. The parking ticket was a signal to me that cracks were appearing in my carefully constructed life.

For St Peter it was a cockerel that was the signal that things were going terribly wrong. As we approach Easter we remember the story of how Peter denied lesus three times. lesus was arrested at night and Peter followed after him, but then lost his nerve and pretended he didn't know him. When the cockerel crowed. Peter remembered lesus telling him this would happen and Peter broke down and wept.

Leonard Cohen (1934-2016) in his song 'Anthem' famously writes that 'There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in'. When cracks appear in our lives they often signal a time when light can emerge. Peter is usually described as the disciple who denied lesus three times, but Peter's failure and brokenness is not the end of his story. The light got into Peter's story because of what he remembered in the darkest place and what he learned.

When the cockerel crowed he remembered that lesus knew him well enough to know that he would let him down. But it wasn't the only thing Peter remembered.


Peter remembered that lesus predicted that he would suffer and die – it wasn't all his fault. Peter remembered the time when lesus rescued him from drowning in Lake Galilee and pulled him through. Peter remembered that at the Last Supper lesus had also told him that he had prayed for him, that his faith would not fail.

After a long dark night the cockerel reminded Peter he had let Jesus down but it also heralded the break of day. Peter's experience and hope meant he was restored and became a great pastor.

My parking ticket signalled a crack which I should notice, and as I have done many times before, readjust my timetable to be more life giving. When you next notice a crack in yourself or another, remember there is a space now, for the light to come in.


